Additionally, the 2016 publication of the Disability in Comics Books and Graphic Narratives collection includes several essays about comics and mental disability. While these works have been important in drawing attention to comics as a space for depicting mental illness, there has not yet been an exclusive study of how comics provide unique opportunities for exploring mental illness.

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With a focus on the comics form's ability to produce alternative and challenging autobiographical narratives, thematic chapters investigate the work of artists writing from perspectives of marginality including gender, sexuality, disability, and race, as well as trauma.
